In Nebraska, Burnett met and married William Wallace Stewart II. They had one child, a son named William Wallace Stewart III. Burnett had no other children. In 1933, when William Wallace Stewart III was 3 years old, the couple divorced. She later married Donald Burnett and they remained married until his death in 1989. This collection contains a scrapbook of letters, photographs, and memorabilia about a trip Burnett took to Guatemala in July-August 1949.
